George Bramson Memorial Scholarship Award Presented

Carolyn Bramson, George's eldest daughter, had the honor of presenting the *CSUS George Bramson Memorial Award in Historic Preservation* at this year's BPNA Spaghetti Dinner. The recipients were Heather Downey and Bill Burg, two Sacramento State University Masters students who have already made significant contributions to historic preservation in the Sacramento area.

Heather Downey's thesis project involved a compilation of Sacramento historic research resulting in a comprehensive interpretive plan; "Old Sacramento Underground Tours: Get the Low Down." The Old Sacramento Underground Tours started this summer and are offered in partnership with California State Parks. Heather's project is meant as a tool to orient tour guides and volunteers by equipping them to lead engaging and entertaining historic tours designed around Sacramento's street-raising history of the 1870-80's.

Bill Burg's project includes the extensive research and considerable local legwork

required to nominate the Boulevard Park Neighborhood to the National Register of Historic Places as a Historic District. Bill's name may be familiar to many *Park Beat* readers due to his frequent contributions of articles regarding the history of Boulevard Park.

Both Heather and Bill attended the Spaghetti Dinner, as did Sacramento State University **Professor Lee Simpson**. Professor Simpson is the head of the Public History program that is responsible for issuing Masters Degrees to students, including Heather and Bill. In addition to helping foster student's interest and respect for historic preservation, Professor Simpson has been a great asset to the administration of the scholarship award. Jon Marshack is also recognized for his spirited contribution in serving on the committee which reviews all submitted CSUS projects and selects the scholarship award recipient/s.

The George Bramson Memorial Scholarship was established (in 2002) in honor of George Bramson, who was a noted historic preservation activist in Sacramento. The purpose of the award, granted every other year, is to honor achievement in the field of historic preservation in the Sacramento area by CSUS students. Presenting the award at the spaghetti dinner seems particularly appropriate, as the dinner is held at the Bramson family home, a residence placed in 1998 on the National Register of Historic Places.

October Garden Guide

Things to Plant:

Put in some bright, happy-for-cold weather pansies, violas, snapdragons, Iceland poppies, or sweet peas. Can't decide? Definitely grow some sweet peas; you will thank yourself come spring, with their heavenly fragrance unmatched by no other. You can grow sweet peas either from plants from the nursery, or very easily from seeds sown directly in the ground. Be sure to soak seeds first; and plant in rich, well-drained soil in a sunny spot.

October is a great month for planting trees and shrubs, including California natives. Mild temperatures help reduce transplant shock, and allow the plants to settle into their new surroundings more easily. Keep watering, especially if the rains don't start this month. This is also a great time to select trees for fall color. Some trees with outstanding fall foliage include: Chinese pistache, red oak, tupelo, ginkgo, and scarlet oak. Colors can vary with trees of the same variety, so it's a good idea to see them while they're wearing their Sunday best.

There are still plenty of winter vegetable starts at the nursery: lettuce, chard, spinach, beans, peas, celery, onions, cauliflower, broccoli, and more. Seeds to be sown: radish, spinach, peas and fava beans. Fava beans, by the way, are a great cover crop as well; they fix nitrogen in their roots, and then leave some in the soil for your garden to use later.

Crime Alert

According to police who report regularly at meetings of the Neighborhood Advisory Group (NAG), there has been an increase in "crimes of opportunity" in Midtown, probably due to the "perfect storm" of the economic downturn, with more poverty and reduced police staffing in the city. The uptick in crime includes robberies, car break-ins or opportunistic stealing from open vehicles, vandalism, and some home burglaries, usually through unlocked windows and doors. The street robberies most often happen late at night as patrons leave bars and restaurants to walk to their cars.

It is more important than ever to practice crime prevention, especially as the days get shorter: do not leave your doors and windows unlocked; avoid leaving cell phones, wallets, laptops, etc. in your car; do not leave gardening tools where they are accessible or in view; put your bicycles away where they cannot be seen; avoid carrying large amounts of cash and your credit cards if you are walking; if you are walking at night, do not walk alone.

We have all heard safety and crime prevention presentations at various meetings and at work. For those of us who work for the State, crime prevention tips are part of our safety and orientation classes. All it takes is one moment of forgetfulness or carelessness that can result in endangering your person or property.

If you see something suspicious, do not hesitate to call the police. Even if they are unable to respond immediately, the call log helps them see patterns of crime, which in turn helps them utilize their resources more efficiently. If it is a non-emergency situation, you should also call the city's universal reporting line, 3-1-1. The operator will log the location and nature of incident, which then go into the overall police incident log. I personally spotted an individual on my block within this last month who, in retrospect, was probably a smash-and-grab thief. He was walking in the street from car to car and looking in the windows on the driver's side. I have no doubt that if he hadn't spotted me watching him, one of my neighbors would have had a car window broken with a missing car stereo, etc. Be alert and be aware!

That cryptic title is not just about the much awaited re-opening of the Crocker Art Museum on October 10, it also refers to the day of global action about climate change in which many Sacramento groups also are participating.

To date, five different local projects are listed on the website, http:// www.350.org. These include a river-based activity planned by the Friends of the River Banks, the only event that is not scheduled on October 10; a 100-mile potluck and idea exchange (using local food products that have traveled no more than 100 miles); an initiative requiring McGeorge Law School faculty, staff, and students to commute to campus by any means other than cars; a communal work day in the school garden of the Fruit Ridge Elementary and Language Academy of Sacramento; and the opportunity to help members of the Sacramento Area Bicycle Advocates (SABA) with bike valet parking at the Crocker Art Museum's re-opening celebration.

Residents also can do things on their own to address climate change, such as fix up their bicycles and use them for local transportation, install fluorescent light bulbs, put up a clothes line instead of loading up the electric dryer, or even plant a garden. Historic House: 2131 H Street

The former home of Dr. Aden C. Hart, a founder of Sutter Hospital, is one of the most eclectic residences in Boulevard Park and the only one listed as "Essential" in the city's 1978 Boulevard Park Preservation Area Survey. Designed by architect Alden W. Campbell and built in 1909, this large house has unusual sculptural embellishments that have long attracted the attention of passersby, such as the carved lion's head over the front porch. Other distinctive details include a Palladian-style loggia on the third floor, Ionic columns, art glass windows, and several different types of shingles.

Those are the physical features of the house. However, it also has attracted attention for other reasons, including numerous stories of paranormal activities that make it the most appropriate selection for the October issue of Park Beat. Unoccupied for many years, the house is said to be haunted. Whether or not the rumors of ghosts are true, they certainly fit the house's lonely appearance. It is hard to imagine that any child would find it easy to step on its front porch and call out "trick or treat" on Hallowe'en.
